

Frances Ridley Havergal

1836-1879



Interesting particulars of Miss Havergal's life are nearly as well-known as her lovely hymns. She was born at the end of the year 1836. She was the sixth and youngest child of the Rev. Henry Havergal and of Jane his wife. Her father was at that time Rector of Astley, Worcestershire. He and his wife were both very earnest, spiritually-minded, evangelical Christians; and their home was rich in all holy influences, in much beauty, and in delightful musicales. The last baby, Frances shared the happy fate of most last babies; she was the special pet of the family and seems to have been designed by nature for that position. At two years old she was a very fairy-like creature, with light curling hair, bright expression, and a most fair

complexion. A prettier child, writes her elder sister, Miriam, was seldom seen. Much of this sunny fairness and brightness she kept throughout her life.

At a very early age Frances picked up a good bit of knowledge without much trouble to herself. At morning prayers she always sat on her father's knee whilst he read the Scriptures, and from him she learned to sing hymns very sweetly. When she was three she could read easy books, and was often found, hidden under a table with some engrossing story. At four Frances could read the Bible, but great care was always taken not to tire her, or to excite the precocity of her mind. Rhymes came naturally to her. Her father was a great composer of hymn tunes and sacred poetry and music filled the atmosphere in which she lived.

Her first well-known hymn was written in 1859, during a visit to Germany, when she was twenty-three years old. It was inspired by a picture of the Crucifixion under which were the words: "I gave My life for thee." The hymn nearly went into the fire, for Frances was dissatisfied with her work; but instead of burning it, on second thought she put it, crumpled and singed, into her pocket. Later on she read the verses to a dear old Christian in an almshouse, who was so delighted with them that the young authoress made copies and sent them to friends.

Miss Havergal's best known hymn was written in 1874, while staying in London with a large family who did not quite share her devotion to the Lord. She prayed for them all, and had the joy of receiving them one after another, where she was able to help them. Unable to sleep on the last night of her visit, she sat up and wrote, "Take My Life and Let It Be Consecrated, Lord, to Thee."

Miss Havergal also wrote many small devotional tracts and narratives in prose and numerous little books of poems and hymn texts, all marked by the same earnest and practical piety. Themes for her writings were faith, consecration, and service.

Frances Havergal was a contemporary of Fanny Crosby (1820-1915). Although these two gifted women never met, each was an admirer of the other.

Forgiveness

“Who can forgive sins, but God alone?” Luke 5:21

What is forgiveness? Why is it so very important in the Christian’s life? Just how much does God expect me to forgive? In this issue I would like to discuss this very important subject with you girls and help you to understand the answers to the questions above and others that you may have.

People do wrong things. There are times that the wrong is committed by mistake. Most of the time, however, the ill deed was done with full intentions to hurt you or to get even with you for something done to them, either true or imagined. There are even times that a person will commit a wrong with intent to gratify themselves with no thought of the hurt it will cause another person. However it is done, when you are on the receiving end of the hurt, it is never easy to take, let alone forgive. But that is exactly the example that our Lord Jesus has left for us to follow. Jesus spent His entire life here on earth doing good to the people around Him, healing them and giving them joy and peace, yet when they nailed Him to the cross His words speak the true feelings of His heart: **“Father, forgive them; for they know not what they do.”** (Luke 23:34) This is forgiveness defined; pardon, to give up the wish to punish, to choose to not condemn and forget the wrong that was done. “For even hereunto were ye called: because Christ also suffered for us, leaving us an example, that ye should follow his steps.” (1Peter 2:21)

“But what if I do not want to forgive?” It is not easy to forgive someone when they have hurt you. But there is more than one person that is going to suffer from your resolve not to forgive, and one of them is you. When you do not forgive, you allow bitterness and resentment to develop in your heart that will keep you away from God. “If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear *me*.” (Ps. 66:18) Every time that you try to pray or read your Bible, the unforgiveness that you have in your heart will come to your mind. The Lord explained it this way, **“Therefore if thou bring thy gift to the altar, and there rememberest that thy brother hath ought against thee; Leave there thy gift before the altar, and go thy way; first be reconciled to thy brother, and then come and offer thy gift.”** (Matt. 5:23-24) This scripture can work both ways. Basically, if you have a problem with someone you need to get things right with him or her before you come to God for anything. Forgiveness opens your heart to receive the blessings of God that you cannot receive if bitter resentment is there already. By determining to not forgive, you are closing the door to reconciliation, so there can be no end to the hurt that you feel.

“This person keeps hurting me over and over again. How many times am I suppose to forgive him?” Peter asked the same question, “Then came Peter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him? till seven times? Jesus saith unto him, **I say not unto thee, Until seven times: but, Until seventy times seven.**” (Matt. 18:21-22) Four hundred and ninety times? Do not feel bad if you think that is a lot. The only answer that the apostles had for that was, **“Increase our faith.”** The Lord gave such a large figure to make a point here. One of the hardest things to take is when someone has wronged you and you discover that instead of the one time that you know about, there are multiple times that the wrong was done. So this mountain of pain comes crushing down on you and you know there is no way on earth that you can forgive this much. You want to hate

them, to wad them up and throw them away and never have to look at their face again. You want to see them hurt, so you think that if you just do not forgive them and show them how hurt you are that this is the best thing to do. But is it? Obviously not, if you are a child of God. You must realize that if you love God and His justice and holiness, you must forgive. **“But I say unto you which hear, Love your enemies, do good to them which hate you, Bless them that curse you, and pray for them which despitefully use you.” (Luke 6:27-28)** Jesus goes on to say that if you love those who love you, or do good to those that do good to you, “what thank have ye?” Jesus loved you while you were against Him and wanted nothing to do with Him. Are we not to be like our Savior?

“But this person does not deserve to be forgiven.” Yes, you are very right. There is no one that deserves to be forgiven for we are all guilty before a Holy God. Do you realize that includes you, too? God did not send Jesus to this world to make a way for you to be forgiven because you deserved it. God could not even forgive you just because He loved you. He loved you enough to send His Son. Jesus came to take the penalty for your sins so that you could come before a Holy God forgiven for the unjust deeds that you have committed against Him. If God has forgiven you of your trespasses, how can you not forgive someone else for the things they have done to you? **“For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.” (Matt. 6:14-15)**

“Well, I have told them that I forgive them, but how can I ever forget the things that they have done to me?” God made us with a very special thing; memory. It is as impossible for us to forget something as it is for Him to forget something. I know that it has been taught that God does forget our sin when we are forgiven, sermons have been preached about it and songs have been sung, and in a way, they are right. But the beauty of His forgetting is that He chooses not to remember, not that He erases it from His memory. If I have done a great wrong and asked forgiveness of the one that I have wronged and he forgives me, does it make me appreciate the forgiveness more if I know that he does not remember it at all or knowing that he does remember but does not condemn me for it but loves me anyway? When Jesus writes “Forgiven” on me, He does not condemn me for my past again. He will press me about certain things that I need to confess to someone to make my heart purer and closer to Him, but that is not reminding me of the wrong I have done. Your own heart will condemn you and make you sorry but that only tends to make you love your “Forgiver” more.

Love is the key that opens the door to forgiveness and will also make the forgiven one love all the more. Jesus spoke of this kind of love. In Luke 7:36-50, Jesus was at the home of a Pharisee for a meal one day when a woman came in quietly and began crying at Jesus feet, kissing His feet and drying her tears with her hair. Then she took very expensive ointment and anointed Jesus’ feet, a very loving gesture. Knowing the Pharisee was very indignant, Jesus told a story of one who had owed a little and another who had owed much, which had both been forgiven their debts, and asked him which would love their forgiver more. The Pharisee answered truthfully, “I suppose that *he*, to whom he forgave most.” You are so very right, Mr. Pharisee!

“What if I choose not to forgive them.” You can do that. But you should know the consequences before you do. “For if ye forgive men their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you: But if ye forgive not men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses.” (Matt. 6:14-15) The question at the beginning of this devotion is: “Who can forgive sins, but God alone?” The answer is: “You can!” We do not forgive sins as God does, to save a soul from hell, but if you do not forgive you could cause someone never to know the love of God and therefore you would be condemning them. To forgive someone is to show them the love of God, for God is love and will forgive the sins that have been committed against Him and will love. If you do not forgive, you are blurring the image of Christ in the eyes of another. Therefore, you have the greater sin. We, as followers of Christ, are obligated to show His love to the world and the best way is through forgiveness. When you do not forgive, you bind your own life in chains of resentment and bitterness. A man named Lewis B. Smedes said this: “To forgive is to set a prisoner free and discover that...the prisoner was you.” The truth is, if you can not forgive someone else the wrong things that they have done to you, it is very possible that you have never been forgiven, either.

“But it so hard to forgive!” Yes, it is, unless your love is more than your hurt. It takes much grace from God to be able to forgive, but when you decide that is what you are going to do, God will give you that grace. And I promise you, if you will forgive, your life will never be better. You will learn the lesson of the Cross of Christ.

Crafts

Paper Crafting



- 6"x6" yellow card stock
- 3"x3" dark yellow card stock
- 4"x4" blue card stock
- 3"x3" green card stock
- Embroidery floss in:
Blue, Yellow, and Green
- 2" and 1 1/4" circle patterns
- Paper craft tool kit



- Directions: 1. Cut a 1 1/2 inch circle from yellow card stock. Pierce holes in center and 8 holes 1/8th inch from edge evenly spaced around circle. Stitch a flower using the daisy stitch.
2. Cut a 2" circle of dark yellow card stock. Pierce holes 1/4 inch from edge, approximately 3/16" apart around circle. Stitch buttonhole stitch around edge.
 3. Cut 1"x 1/2" piece of green card stock. Pierce holes 1/4" apart down center. Stitch backstitch in green. Trim card stock to 1/4" wide for flower stem.
 4. Using leaf template (above), pierce holes for two leaves on remaining green card stock. Stitch leaf veins using backstitch. Trim to leaf shape after stitching.
 5. Trim blue card stock to 3.5"x3.5" square. Pierce holes 1/4" from edge around perimeter.
 6. Stitch using the chain stitch.
 7. Cut a 4"x4" square of dark yellow card stock. To put the flower all together, glue blue square onto yellow square, add stem and leaves. The glue large flower on stem followed by the smaller light yellow center. This can be used on a card or scrapbook page.

Ribbon Bulletin Boards

These boards are easy and can make a pretty addition to your room. You may use different things for the board itself; either purchase a small non-framed board, two sheets of foam core board (1/8" thick each) or corrugated cardboard glued together, or a flat piece of styrofoam (about 1/2" thick). The rest of the materials are as follows:



- Polyester quilt batting to fit your board.
- Small, sharp pins / Hot glue gun with extra glue sticks
- A cutting knife / Fabric of your choice
- Ribbon 1/4 inch contrasting, 3/8 inch and 5/8 inch matching
- Buttons for trim

Press creases and wrinkles from your material and cut to fit (the material must be at least 3 inches larger than your board on all sides). Place the material face down on a flat surface; center batting on material and top with the prepared board. With hot glue, folding the edges toward the center, glue first the sides and then the top and bottom of fabric to the back of your board, mitering the corners as you glue. Next, glue your 5/8" ribbon in a criss-cross pattern as you see in the picture, using the pins to hold them in place until they are secure. Glue buttons on at the cross sections of the ribbon. Finish the edges nicely by gluing the 3/8" ribbon around the outside edge and top it with the 1/4" ribbon, using your pins again. (See small picture above.) Make a loop on the back of the board for hanging and glue in place.

The Cooking Counter

Swiss Tuna Melts



- 1 can light water-pack tuna, drained and flaked
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup shredded Swiss Cheese
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sour cream
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup mayonnaise
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped onion
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup chopped celery
- Pepper to taste
- 8 slices bread

2-3 tablespoons butter, softened

Combine first seven ingredients; make four sandwiches and toast them in a skillet with the butter. Cut in half and serve immediately.

Creamy Coleslaw

- 10.5 oz. Cabbage, shredded
- 2 carrots, grated
- 2 green onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons sour cream
- 1 teaspoon mustard
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Salt and Pepper to taste



First, mix the mayonnaise, sour cream, mustard, vinegar, sugar, salt and pepper; stir until creamy. In a large bowl, toss cabbage, carrot, and onion; spoon dressing mixture on top and stir to coat well. Cover and refrigerate for about 1 hour before serving.

Orange Juice Spritzer

- 1 quart orange juice
- 1 liter ginger ale, chilled
- $\frac{1}{4}$ cup maraschino cherry juice

Orange wedges and maraschino cherries

In a 2 qt. container, combine the orange juice, ginger ale and cherry juice; stir well. Serve over ice. Garnish each glass with an orange wedge and cherry.



Rich Hot Fudge Sauce

- 1 cup heavy whipping cream
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup butter, cubed
- 1- $\frac{1}{3}$ cups brown sugar
- $\frac{1}{3}$ cup sugar
- pinch salt
- 1 cup baking cocoa
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup plus 2 tablespoons light corn syrup
- 2 squares (1 ounce each) unsweetened chocolate
- 3 teaspoons vanilla
- 1 to 2 teaspoons rum extract



In a heavy saucepan, combine cream and butter. Cook and stir over medium-low heat until butter is melted. Add the sugars and salt; cook and stir until sugar is dissolved, about 4 minutes. Stir in the cocoa and corn syrup; cook and stir for 3 minutes or until cocoa is blended. Add chocolate; cook and stir 3-4 minutes or until melted. Reduce heat to low. Simmer 12-16 minutes or until mixture reaches desired thickness, stirring constantly. Remove from heat; stir in extracts. Cool slightly. Store in the refrigerator.
